Pronouns

Beginning in fall 2019, UCSB students will be able to choose their pronouns for class rosters and the online learning environment. This new option for students will pair with UCSB's Preferred Name option to ensure that trans and nonbinary students are being referred to correctly in the classroom by instructors and peers.

Trans Community Resources

UCSB is committed to ensuring that the experiences and needs of transgender and gender expansive students are valued and addressed. Student Health offers a Health Equity Advocate, the Office of the Registrar allows students to input their preferred name, the MultiCultural Center offers a weekly open social and support group, and gender-inclusive restrooms are available throughout campus.

LGBTQ Studies at UCSB

The Department of Feminist Studies is proud to offer a minor in LGBTQ Studies. The minor provides a comprehensive and interdisciplinary examination of the lives, experiences, identities and representations of LGBTQ individuals. The Rainbow House in Manzanita Village is a supportive living environment for LGBTQ students that connects students to LGBTQ organizations, hosts social and educational events and provides a mentorship program.
